Fake news and disinformation online

What's the problem?

Fake news is false or misleading information presented as genuine news.

Your child might have seen fake news online about the Russian invasion of Ukraine. There have been examples of old footage being shared as if it's new, or images being manipulated to present a misleading picture about what's happening. There's been lots of misinformation on TikTok in particular.

Reading information like this can upset or worry your child unnecessarily. Fake news also helps create a culture of fear and uncertainty, with children trusting reputable news outlets less as a result of fake news.

How can I help my child spot fake news online?

Family Engagement Session

- 1) the function and purpose of independent study,
- 2) means if accessing independent study materials via Google Classroom,
- 3) what a student can meaningfully engage with should work not be set (especially reading!),
- 4) how families can best support students to foster skills of independence and an inner drive for success.

Science Symposium

The last two weeks have been full of mentally stimulating and fun-packed activities and trips for students in the Science department. Here is a summary of some of these.

Some students from years 7 and 9 went to the National Space Centre with Dr Duara. The students were not only able to look around the space centre but go into some of the labs that are closed to the public to view and discuss work that is going on within them.

14 girls from year 9 represented NCS at Warwick University and took part in their "Slice of Science" event. The aim of the event was to host young women from the local area and allow them to learn more about science and to inspire them to think about a possible career or education path within STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) pathways.

We also had the annual Griffin Science Symposium year 7 event, this is one of our proud GST traditions. This 2 week event had year 7 students in week 1 carrying out numerous practical and theory lessons with regards to Science and Space. Week 2 was hosted by the Open University and Scientists from there held online live link seminars with our students to further discuss the Space topic and their specialisms within it.

All of these activities linked in nicely with this year's British Science week. All of the participating students were left ultimately enthused about Science, Astrophysics, Space, STEM and the roles that women play in it. Well done to all who took part!

Brief

Text shall be added to the poster by the organisers, so do keep that in mind when designing your masterpiece.

The final poster will:

- Showcase this year's theme: *Change Makers*
- Be suitable for both children and adults i.e., a wide audience
- Advertise and be used for resource material supporting GAF
- Be visually stimulating
- Demonstrate artistic skill of exceptional quality

Guidelines

- The artwork can be submitted in any medium (or mixed media)
- Please consider the context and purpose of your poster
- The final piece should be no larger than A2.
- If you create a three-dimensional work, consider how this will be translated into a flat image.
- Please avoid using text
- Consider the audience attractive for both students and adults.
- The poster must be of a quality that can be reproduced on printed material and online resources, so faint pencil won't work.

Deadline for submission to school TUESDAY 3rd May

Winning entries

Judging of poster will take place at school and up to three pieces shortlisted. Schools need to enter their shortlisted entries into the Arts Folder with the students name, Year and School by MAY 10th. An independent panel with then select the winner and runner up and notified via their school by the end of May. Prizes will be presented at the *Last Night of the Proms* on June 30th.

Wide Horizons

Residential Trip: Losehill Hall, Castleton



Sometimes opportunities come along that are too good to be missed and this was certainly true when students at Nicholas Chamberlaine were offered the opportunity to participate in a residential trip to the Peak District.

Funded by the 'Generation Green' programme, the scheme aims to provide young people with the chance to experience life in the countryside. Having applied last year at the height of Covid restrictions, an email out of the blue revealed that the school had been accepted on to the pro-

gramme and that 34 students could take part in the experience.

Having invited students to take part from Year 9, 10 and 12, our intrepid travellers set off from school on Monday 14th March to Castleton in Derbyshire. Situated in the heart of the Peak District, Castleton is a beautiful village surrounded by steep hills and a network of caverns famed for the mining of a rare mineral, 'Blue John'. Our accommodation was the Losehill Hall Youth Hostel.



After arriving at 4pm, students had an opportunity to orientate themselves before having something to eat. The evening's activity was a stargazing walk with a Peak District National Park Ranger. With little light pollution, students could appreciate the beauty of the night sky.

The following day, students were treated to a full English breakfast and an introduction to that day's activity. With the sun shining, the National Park Rangers, Pete and Andrew explained that students would be walking up Losehill. This, they carefully

explained, was a walk of approximately 3 miles. Students murmured slightly and Pete responded by explaining that 3 miles uphill would be different from a walk on the flat. At 1,500 feet high, Pete had slightly miscalculated students' desire to tackle the slopes. Although challenging, most students persisted, despite a range of minor setbacks, including breathlessness, the occasional fall and mud claiming one student's walking shoes! At the top, everyone was rewarded with stunning views of the surrounding countryside.

Returning to the hostel, students enjoyed lunch and a brief rest. Suitably refreshed, the afternoon's activities involved working with nature. This was the focus of the trip and whilst one group looked at the landscape surrounding the Youth Hostel, others undertook hedge laying. In short, this involved using sharp instruments to cut down trees and bushes to create hedges. Fortunately, all of our students emerged with a full count of fingers!

By now, exhaustion had set in and students were rewarded with a tasty evening meal. That evening's activity was a more sedate walk through the woods and a campfire where marshmallows were toasted and students learnt how to light fires using simple tools. It was perhaps little surprise that by 10:30pm, all was quiet from the rooms - not least because the step count for the day hovered around 20,000!

With Wednesday the last day of the trip, the weather had taken a turn for the worst. The nearby hills were masked by mist and light rain fell, which would later turn into a deluge. Once again, students were offered a choice of activities - either a continuation of hedge laying or a trip into Castleton to see what a Peak District village looks like. Fortunately, the heavy rain that had been forecasted for the day arrived after students had departed Castleton for their return to Bedworth.

Nicholas Chamberlaine students gained a lot from this experience. For some it was their first visit to the Peak District, whilst all rose to the challenge of doing something very different from their day to day lives. Our special thanks must go to the staff of the Losehill Hall Youth Hostel and to Pete and Andrew, the park rangers who created the activities. Also a big thank you to the staff from Nicholas Chamberlaine who attended the event and to our Year 12 students who took part in this as part of their Health and Social Care work.
