Upcoming Opportunities for Democratic Engagement

Nicholas Chamberlaine School and Co-db Collaborative Design and Build ltd are working together on a long-term design project, aiming to transform the way our inside spaces look, feel and are used by students and other stakeholders. Our objective is to transform the inside of our school buildings so that every space becomes a place we can all enjoy spending time, whether we are learning, working, socialising – or all three at once.

As part of our democratic "You said... We did..." ethos, we would like to invite students to become active consultants in the design process, through participation in a series of workshops, site visits and consultation interviews with Co-DB designers. Participating students will be responsible for representing the views of their community and will directly influence decisions made regarding the future transformation of our buildings. We have **twenty-one** student places available for this amazing opportunity to influence lasting, positive changes to our school environment. We are particularly interested in hearing from any student who is interested in a possible future career in Design, Architecture, Fine Art or Media, but welcome applications from all students.

Co-Design Development Workshops

Creative design workshops to generate shared visual references and develop more deeply informed opinions and inputs into the development of the school wide colour and material scheme, focused initially on DAB curriculum areas, halls and the PE block.

Propose workshop plan Jan/Feb 2022

Group of 15-20 interested students and staff from across the school work together with Co-DB across two intensive half-day hands-on workshops.

This might be particularly good for participants interested in architecture or interior design, as well as art students and those interested in local history and school culture.

The aim of the workshop is to inform the next stages of work:

- Design development
- Deliver presentation of proposed scheme
- Make any revisions following presentation
- Create detailed design guidance for each location

Day 1

1345 - Intros and discussion activity

Introductions, get inspiration, discover what's possible, discuss the initial questionnaire results and images, and explore further precedents through group discussion around a prepared slide-show, together developing a brief for the various areas and ideas about the role of colour and materials in that.

1415 - Site visits

Walk to various locations around school, make notes and hold discussions about ideas for each site, thinking about the key learnings from previous exercise in context, including both during lesson time and between periods.

1510 - Close day 1

Return to classroom, discuss findings and the next day's activities.

0900 - Visual media activity

Good morning, work in groups to develop a range of ideas for each space, creating multiple quick collages of the spaces using cut out magazine images, drawings and printed photos, annotated and titled.

1105 - Group discussion

Discuss collages together and work collectively on creating colour pallets using painting and material samples, refining and combining ideas from across the group.

As the country emerges from lockdown, universities and apprenticeship providers are beginning to offer more programmes for young people to participate in.



The music department were also successful in applying for funding to pay for selected KS3 students to take their Grade 2 ABRSM exams.


Christmas Karaoke Competition

'Animal Farm' - George Orwell.


