Parent Factsheet: Fake news and disinformation online

What's the problem?

Fake news is false or misleading information presented as genuine news.

Your child might have seen fake news online about the Russian invasion of Ukraine. There have been examples of old footage being shared as if it's new, or images being manipulated to present a misleading picture. There's been lots of misinformation on TikTok in particular. Fake news and disinformation have also been linked to radicalisation by extremists and attempts to skew people's world views, e.g. extremist narratives relating to coronavirus include:

- Antisemitic conspiracy theories blaming Jewish people for the spread of the virus
- Claims that British Muslims have flouted social distancing rules
- Anti-Chinese hatred
- Isis-inspired narratives about how coronavirus is a divine punishment for the 'sinful behaviours' of the west
- Extreme right-wing conspiracies that society is collapsing and far-right groups can accelerate its end

Reading information like this can upset or worry your child unnecessarily. Fake news also helps create a culture of fear and uncertainty, with children trusting reputable news outlets less as a result of fake news.

How can I help my child spot fake news online?

Tell them to ask themselves:

- What's the source? Is it a reputable news source, and are mainstream news outlets reporting it too?
- When was it published? Check the date an article was published, as sometimes old stories are shared on social media. This could be an accident, or it might be to make it look like something happened recently
- Have you seen anything similar elsewhere? What happens if you search for it on Google or check it using a fact-checking website like Full Fact?
- Do the pictures look real? Images might have been edited. They might also be unrelated images that have been used with the story
- Why might this have been created? Could someone be trying to provoke a specific reaction, change your beliefs, or get you to click a link?

Encourage them to **read beyond the headline too**. Many people share stories having just read the headline, then discover the actual story is quite different.

What signs of radicalisation should I be alert to?

It's worth knowing what signs to be alert to, just in case. If you do see these signs, it doesn't necessarily mean your child is being radicalised – it could be nothing at all, or it could be a sign that something else is wrong.

- Becoming more isolated from friends and family
- Not being willing or able to talk about their views
- Becoming more angry
- Talking as if from a script
- A sudden disrespectful attitude towards others
- Being more secretive, especially about their internet use

This term our Performing Arts house competition will be based on our very much anticipated <u>Musical Matilda</u>






The holding of this event which all 12 Schools within the trust participate is a special opportunity for children and adults to interact and be stimulated by leading scientists and to gain overviews and deeper understanding of current issues and on-going work with regard to how science is, and could in the future help our world to be a better place.

The GST theme this year is Family, with a further GSS focus on Connections, to expand on the Trust theme and encompass the theme for British Science Week (BSW) this year.

Here at NCS Students have participated in live lessons hosted by Dr Alice Dunford of the Open University in which she has discussed exciting scientific topics related to Space exploration, such as the Jupiter mission and the building and testing of space cameras. Students will also be taking part in a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) practical based activity/competition hosted by the Science department linked to this year's theme within their scheduled lessons in Science.

Our year 7s have engaged greatly in this event and have shown a great enthusiasm for Science. This event has inspired many great questions during this process which have been fielded to both Dr Dunford and the members of the Science department. Well done to all in year 7, as always you have done NCS proud!"



Wide Horizons

Interior design

James Sale, an interior design expert from Co-DB, held a design workshop with Y10 students to reimagine our potential use of space on our English and Maths corridor.

Students explored a range of potential functions for the space and considered its use, including practical applications for learning, quiet study and as social space. They built an architectural model as a visual concept, collaborating to work with a range of materials and considering aspects such as furniture, space, light and purpose.

The ideas generated from our workshop today will form the foundation of designs for future development of this project: the decisions of our own students impacting on our own learning spaces. An example of "You Said... We Did..." in action - watch this space, quite literally!

Year 10 Update

The Year 10 countdown to the trial exams is now live!

Today, Y10 received their revision packs in our "Internal Exams Launch Assembly". Students have been provided with revision plans from each subject that will be completing internal exams. There are no exams for PE BTEC, Art, Photography or Health and Social at this time as students are continuing to complete coursework. All other subjects will be providing the students with an opportunity to show their exam skills that they have been working towards in lessons.

Please note, although the term "trial exams" or "mocks" may be used by the students, we are treating these with the importance of "real" exams. Our vision is to establish good routines ready for the end of Y11 to relieve exam stress surrounding what to expect. The results will give a good indication of the progress made by students in order to tailor support, teaching and learning techniques and ensuring the students are equipped with feedback to reach their full potential, and more!

Attendance to examinations

100% attendance during this time is imperative. If your child is absent during the examination period, then they could risk having to either sit exams separately from their peers or not receive a grade. This will hugely impact their whole examination experience, subject progress and improvement of their current knowledge and skills.

If your child is absent, please ensure you are able to provide medical evidence.

Equipment required

Students are required to have all of their own equipment ready for exams. To help with this, we have provided all Y10 students with some equipment in their packs given out today. Equipment will not be provided on the day of exams. Students must take responsibility for ensuring they are prepared so please encourage them to pack the night before.

Revision plans

It is crucial that your child revises independently and in addition to the tutoring provided for them. Students have login details for a range of online platforms such as Tassomai (Science), Seneca (English) and Dr Frost (Mathematics). These are designed to help students revise independently, linking each skill to the GCSE syllabus. All subjects have supplied revision plans for the students on the countdown to exams to help aid planning revision time over the next 6 weeks.

<u>Nationally on average, Year 11 students revise for 2 hours per day</u>

The Hub and Library are open from 8am for a quiet study space.

Free breakfast with subject staff will be available from 8.15am during the exam period (place to be confirmed).

Child Exploitation Awareness Week



Child exploitation is a type of abuse and is when someone uses a child for financial gain, sexual gratification, labour, or personal advantage.

When a child or young person is exploited, they're groomed by being given things, like gifts, drugs, money, status and affection. This is usually in exchange for carrying out a criminal activity, known as Child Criminal Exploitation or performing sexual activities, known as Child Sexual Exploitation.

Monday 13th March saw the start of Child Exploitation Awareness Week within Warwickshire, leading up to National Child Exploitation Awareness Day on Saturday 18th March 2023.
