Rotary competitions

NCS is always proud to participate in Rotary competitions. This year these comprise: **Young Artist** is Colours of Nature. As before this needs to be a 2D unframed piece which can use paints, drawing, collage - See Mr Marriott for details

Young Photographer theme is also Colours of Nature. This year the entrants are only to submit one photograph (of at least 150 pixels on the longest length of the picture). They can use cameras or mobile phones to take the photo - See Mr Marriott for details

Young Writer theme is Environment. The entrants can submit either a piece of prose (500 words max) or a poem (max 40 lines) - See Ms Chapman for details

Young Chef Entries are expected at district level to produce 3 courses in 2 hours (which would be good practice to include in our local heat) at a cost of under £20—See Ms Johnson for details

Monologue Festival-Drama Medal

A popular addition to our *GAF competitions* in 2021 was the <u>Drama medal</u> which is now determined by a monologue competition. The monologues for the school round are divided into age groups therefore Nicholas Chamberlaine students are to perform KS3 and KS4 monologues and any student can apply!

This year the competition will start in Jan/Feb in all schools and gradually move through regional finals to a grand **final on June 30**th. The winner of the Grand final will be presented with a new award **The Margaret Lewis Cup**, which will be displayed at their school and a book voucher worth £50. Runners up will also receive book vouchers.

The competition will have 3 judging points:

School heats (judged by school staff)→
HUB finals → (judged by Drama staff from across the Trust)
Regional (London/Birmingham) judged by a special panel
The grand finale of this competition will be held at GAF 2022

Applications process:

Schools should run their own finals and select ONE winner for each age group:

KS1, KS2 (Year 3 &4), KS2 (Year 5 & 6), KS3, KS5

A recording of that winner doing their monologue should be made making sure the audio is clear

Ability to:

- Clearly convey the meaning of the text
- Become the character speaking the text

 - use of voice and tempo variations (not monotone)
 - creates a mood, the experience, or emotion of character

GAF: Student leadership recruitment

From 20th June 20—Fri 1st July we will be holding a residential GAF for a select group of Year 5 students. **We are seeking 10 secondary students** from NCS (for London) and from The Lammas (for Birmingham) to help lead this event.

The role has 4 key parts:

- 1. Helping the GAF team plan for GAF 2022
- 2. Leading on creative work during GAF
- 3. Working with an assigned group as a co-leader
- 4. Contributing feedback to the GAF 2022 evaluation

What do secondary students need to do before GAF?

- 1. Attend a training session
- 2. Prepare a creative outdoor and indoor learning activity for a group of 10 children related to the activities we will be doing at galleries, exhibitions, and workshops. Information to help with this will be provided at the training session.
- 3. think about the skills, equipment, and requirements of working with children outdoor/ in a non-classroom situation.

What do secondary students do at GAF?

- Assist staff with the delivery and additional planning of activities, You will have the opportunity to use your own artistic talents to lead a creative project during GAF.
- Experience all the fun arts activities like practical workshops, exploring museums, seeing live theatre, and music.
- Though it is a lovely opportunity to spend time with any friends who are also leaders, you need to be willing to commit your time to supporting the children and staff during the days and evening activities, and to be ready and prepared to jump into action and use your initiative.

What sort of personal qualities do they need to have?

Students who are passionate about the arts; art, drama, music, and those who are interested in artists and musicians and actors, or becoming teachers, people interested in the care industry, youth workers, students interested in developing their people and leadership skills.

Music at NCS

Year 9 Music - Options

We have been overwhelmed with the amount of students that are hoping to take GCSE Music. After learning to play an orchestral instrument for over 2 years, some of our Year 9 students are now ready to take the next step on their musical journey.

On Tuesday lunchtime, MU2 was full to capacity with students taking a 'GCSE Music taster session'. Students started to learn about Samba music, by forming a Samba band. Every student played a part in the Samba band, and the group mastered an impressive short performance in just 20 minutes.





How will Music help me in the future?

Music is an academic subject in its own right, but it actually benefits other subjects too.

A recent study in the UK found that playing a musical instrument appears to enhance general performance in other subjects at GCSE. Other studies have shown that music benefits learning by activating all areas of the brain: auditory (sound processing); motor (rhythm processing); and limbic (emotions).

So by choosing music, your child could actually be improving their chances of doing well in their other subjects – including those within the Ebacc.

It will provide transferable skills

GCSE music involves written, analytical, practical and social/personal skills such as:

- independent learning: having to be disciplined about practising their instrument or voice
- team working: particularly if they're involved in weekly groups or ensembles, concerts and performances
- performance and presentation skills which are useful for any job/career
- listening: this is highly developed in musicians and it is an important part of the course
- analytical and essay-writing skills
- confidence and self-esteem: which has a knock-on effect in all areas of life and learning
- creativity and self-expression: helping young people to think differently and harness the power of their imagination

Both employers and universities see creative subjects as an asset

Increasingly, employers and universities are looking for young people who have skills that are learned through creative subjects: creative thinking, emotional intelligence, adaptability, communication and tenacity to name just a few. And universities are keen to attract students who have a well-rounded education and achieve good results, no matter what the subject.

Students to gain extra musical qualifications, thanks to SAF

The Music department have successfully secured funding from the Trust's **Griffin Sports and Arts Fund** to enter able musicians for ABRSM (*Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music*) graded

music exams.



An ABRSM grade has a worldwide currency and their exams are designed to motivate learners at all levels and ages. Students wishing to take their Grade 2 exam in the Summer term should talk to their instrumental teacher. The exam will consist of a performance of four pieces that students will have prepared over the Summer term.

At a cost of £55 for each exam, paid by the

Trust, students will need to be dedicated and have a good practice schedule



Fair Play - Exploring pathways to inclusive musical participation

New funding has been awarded by **Youth Music** to Worcestershire, Gloucestershire and Warwickshire Music Hubs to improve musical inclusion within the three areas. NCS are currently working on this project, led by **Severn Arts** (lead for Worcestershire Music Education Hub) with the aim to improve and embed inclusive practice within their organisations. The project entitled 'Fair Play' will bring together the skills and experience of the three lead organisations and partners to focus on establishing youth voice and removing barriers to musical engagement.

To launch the project Severn Arts have requested that KS3 students complete the following questionnaire. If students feel that they would benefit from having instrumental lessons on a 1:1 basis, and they wish to be considered for entry to graded examinations, students should explicitly state this on the questionnaire.

Your Time to Lead

We have been successful in becoming part of a nationwide initiative funded through the Department for Education called Your Time to Lead.

Your Time to Lead Learning Programme

This is an online, accredited learning programme consisting of six modules that will support female leaders (14 years and over) to:

- Understand existing barriers to participation for girls
- Identify what their female peers recognise as engaging competitive sport opportunities
- Lead an event or competition to provide those opportunities for female participants

We will be identifying 6 and 10 girls to be on the programme, who will be training to lead sessions to around 25 girls in Year 7 and 8. This programme can be used as prior learning towards the full Level 2 award in sports leadership.


High Achievement


Geography

The geography department are pleased to have been able to get outside and participate in a field-work trip, having been unable to go for the last two years. Fieldwork allows students to study geography in real life contexts and is also recognised as an important skill in geography education, being assessed at both GCSE and A level.

Just before the Christmas holiday, year 11 geographers went to Coombe Abbey and tested the hypothesis, 'humans have had a negative impact on the small scale ecosystems at Coombe Abbey', using techniques such as field sketches, footfall counts and species transects to collect data. They have since been presenting their data and will go on to analyse, come to conclusions and evaluate their findings.







Other year groups have had the opportunity to look at techniques within school, for example year 7 have created their own field sketches, year 8 have completed a litter survey and year 12 have been considering a range of opportunities on the coast.

We are looking forward to getting out with other year groups soon.
